# MISSIONS



## October Mission - SACA FOOD SHELF IN COLUMBIA HEIGHTS

Our Mission focus for October is the Southern Anoka Community Assistance (SACA) Food Shelf, founded in 1976 to help meet the food insecurity needs of residents in Columbia Heights, Hill Top, Fridley and Spring Lake Park. Dave Rudolph, Food Shelf Co-Coordinator has been directing this organizations program efforts for the past 12 years. He reports an ever-increasing demand for the food shelf. In 2015 the program served 24,000 people; that number grew in 2021, to over 50,000 persons served. During his tenure, the program has changed from past clients receiving groceries pre-packed by staff while today's clients self-select food that fits their individual family tastes. SACA operates on food and financial donations from the community. They use monetary donations to buy food through Second Harvest where each \$1 can purchase over 10 pounds of food.

SACA provides healthy food for our community members in need, with the goal of supporting a pathway to stability and self-sufficiency. The food shelf also provides for food delivery through a program called SACA Delivers. The service focuses on clients who find it hard to travel and pick up food at the food shelf. They receive a monthly delivery of food to their home or apartment. 10 local schools and several Senior Centers/Senior Apartments also receive food deliveries for those in need of food assistance.

SACA's 1976 origin story features the good works of a single Columbia Heights resident who saw a need and began giving food out of the trunk of her car. Increased need and an expanding organization required a new home for SACA's program. They were now a growing program operating out of a home with small rooms, skinny hallways and food deliveries being stored in the basement by passing down a refashioned coal chute.

The program moved to its current Columbia Heights facility in 1995. The Food Shelf is again outgrowing today's facility. A Building fund has been established in anticipation of their lease expiring in May of 2029.

Who are clients of the food shelf?: Large families, single parent families, individual adults, students, and Seniors are served by the food shelf.

What life circumstances bring people to seek food assistance? Clients often speak of seeking assistance when they are going through a rough patch lasting 1 – 3 months.

Big bills, lost jobs, retirement that doesn't cover their needs and prescriptions outstripping their budget bring clients to seek help.

Most recently, inflation has made it difficult for people to meet their food needs. They simply run out of money after the rent, utilities and transportation costs are paid.

SACA also runs a Thrift Store that is open to the public. All essential items are affordably priced. Thrift store items are donated by the community and the store is maintained and staffed by volunteers. All (yes, 100%) of revenue from the sales is used to purchase food. All donations to the SACA Thrift Store are tax deductible.

Currently 3 FUMC members volunteer their time with SACA. Jody Lee, Gary Boyer, and Jeff Mondloh volunteer for 4 hour shifts each week. We assist clients with food selection or work in the warehouse. SACA can always use additional volunteers. Speak with one of us if you would like to learn about the opportunities available.

The food needs for our community are great. Please consider donating to this worthy cause.
